


# Newsletter ~ December 2018 Snettisham Primary School





It is amazing to reflect upon the fabulous learning that has taken place across the school!

Children in Oak Class have made their new teacher, Mrs Dack, feel very welcome and have settled well. They have been adding two 2-digit numbers, as well as consolidating their number bonds in maths. The children have planned and written stories based on the film 'Taking Flight' and have made leaflets containing all the information they have learnt about the Romans. They have also written letters to Father Christmas in preparation for the big day! Ash Class returned after half term with fabulous shields they'd created as part of their home learning. Following on from this, the children have enjoyed learning about the Romans, including empire, army and language. They sequenced significant events on a timeline and wrote fact files about Julius Caesar! In maths, the children have been focusing on calculations, as well as covering perimeter. The 'Big Draw' was inspired by the work of Claude Monet. The children used sketching and digital media to create their own artworks in an impressionist style!





Following the creation of their beautiful felt pictures, **Birch Class** set about writing instructions, complete with bullet points, a list of equipment and top tips! They also wrote a biography about Boudicca and a story based on the film 'Taking Flight'. In maths, the children have been looking at fractions, finding equivalents, simplifying and adding mixed numbers.

In topic work, the children have been considering differences in the geographical features of Italy and Britain, focusing on rivers, beaches and buildings etc.

The 'Big Draw' day was particularly successful with the children producing a collaborative piece of art using a range of mediums, inspired by the work of Georgia O'Keeffe.



The children in **Willow Class** have had a busy half term! The children have been studying 'Blue Penguin', our power of reading book, focusing on themes around identity and belonging plus learning all about Antarctica. The children have been developing their number sense of the numbers to 10 and looking at how to solve addition number problems. We also had a fantastic talk from Donna the dental nurse about how to care for our teeth. She explained that we should avoid sugary drinks and snacks. She even did a tooth brushing session with the children!







## Lynn Museum Visit

On 16<sup>th</sup> November, Oak Class visited Lynn Museum to take part in an 'Invaders' workshop. They were thrilled to ride on the top deck of a double decker bus on the way there, taking in all the scenery and admiring our local landmarks.

When they arrived at the museum the children were welcomed by Elizabeth and Sam. First, Sam showed the children some artefacts that would have been used in castles. Then Elizabeth took the children to taste some honey bread; all the children agreed that it was delicious! After lunch, the children looked at some Roman artefacts including a chopping bowl which had lots of stones inside it! The children also had the opportunity to dress up as a Roman and to design and make a mosaic to take home.

The children enjoyed the whole experience and it really helped bring to life the learning taking place in school.
